Course Content: An introduction to the theory and application of economic principles, as adumbrated in the Bible and examined in light of the writings of Reformed theologians, especially Luther and Calvin. Modern economic theories will be compared and contrasted with those found in ancient civilizations, including Semitic, African, and Native American. Theories of economic scaffolding will receive especial attention.

Required Text Book: Mankiw, N. Gregory. 2004. Principles of Economics. South Western. Thomson Learning. *Custom Publishing*.

Course Goal: To gain the skills necessary to understand, teach, and implement economic theory and practice from a Christian worldview.

Course Requirements:

1. A five-page paper on either Luther or Calvin's economic theory.
2. Complete reading the text assignments by the day specified.
3. There will be a mid term and final exam.

2. The tests will count 25% each
3. Daily quizzes over the reading will count 25%
